

How to make a “cone-shaped” compost bin into a Worm Farm

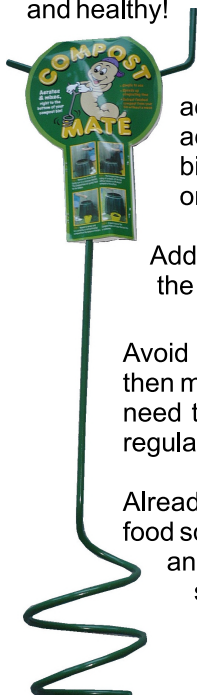
A compost bin like this one can be a vibrant worm farm that processes buckets of food scraps, plus garden and paper waste, every week! If you are starting from scratch, fill it 1/3 with food scraps, compost, garden waste and paper (and water well) BEFORE you add worms.



To create a worm farm from a compost bin that is tall and cone shape, you need to add the following :

1. Water to moisten the organic material to be recycled;
2. Garden lime to sweeten the pile for the worms;
3. Air to the pile regularly – we recommend using the Compost Mate;
4. Compost worms, at least 1000 (250g) – Tiger worms;
5. Food scraps regularly to the pile.

Compost Worms speed up and improve compost, producing a high-quality material called “humus” from their castings – this is the best part of the soil that makes it alive and healthy!



Use your Compost Mate tool* regularly to mix- in the food scraps and add air deep into the pile – your worms will love you for it! This mixing action allows you to get the food scraps into the deeper layers of the bin, so worms can start working, and flies don't land on the food sitting on the surface.

Adding air to the pile regularly will speed up your composting time – so will the addition of compost worms!

Avoid thick layers of fresh grass - dry it first then mix it in. Once worms are added, you will need to give the pile water and food scraps regularly, **because it is now alive.**
